## A message from the Mayor

There is so much happening in and around our community that I'm not too sure where to start. Here is a quick update:

- We continue to discuss and explore aged care options to find a model that works for us
- We also continue to meet with a range of people who are interested in investing in Robe in the future
- The recent meeting with the Shadow Cabinet was valuable. James and I presented an overview of our community and a draft of the prospectus which generated plenty of discussion
- We have been proactive in meeting with our community on a range of issues including GMO, airfield hangars, beach camping, tourism, national trust just to name a few
- The meeting with Nicola Spurrier was really valuable and has provided us with an avenue to bring over the dredging contractors from Victoria so the channel can be completed before the fishing season starts. What a great outcome for our fishing industry
- The letter I sent to our Victorian ratepayers offering to check their homes and just to let them know we are thinking about them was well received. We have done about a dozen checks so far and helps some of our non-resident ratepayers feel not quite so isolated
- I have had a few informal meetings with people asking for details on the draft Prospectus. We had hoped to run a community meeting at the end of August but with some uncertainty around the COVID-19 situation, we have put it off for a date yet to be determined in September. It is only a DRAFT of ideas that have been accumulating over the past 12-18 months. Please be assured that the community will have ample opportunity to provide feedback and comments when we can safely get everyone in a room together. We will also find a way of consulting with our non-resident ratepayers as part of the process

• If you haven't already, please download the MyLocal Services App – it is a very easy way to report an issue within our Council area. If you don't feel comfortable down loading the app, give me a call and I'll help you through it. It is a brilliant way to report all of those maintenance issues that we all see around the town

• It is sad to see the loss of our regional newspapers. Elected Members have discussed how this will impact how Council communicates with ratepayers with things like development applications which are normally advertised in the Coastal Leader. We are working on a solution but nothing is concrete as yet

• Finally, I would like to say how honoured I was to be asked, along with Nick McBride, by the Robe BSL Branch to present certificates and medals to Brian Nankivell and Victor Dawson as our only 2 remaining veterans of World War II. It was the 75th anniversary of the end of war on 15 August and the RSL held a small celebration to recognise both veterans.

# Chief Executive Officer's Report

## A Big Thank You!

I would like to thank Robe Primary School, community members and Council employees for planting 2,000 shrubs on Hoopers and Fox Beaches. This action was taken to try and stabilise the dunes.

Led by our new Director Infrastructure, Rob Moir, this important initiative is due to coastal erosion at Fox and Hoopers Beaches. Each year Council spends about \$40,000 moving sand from Karatta Beach to replenish these two Beaches to assist in minimising the impact of winter storms on our dunes. Even though it was a cold and wet day, we could not have achieved timely planting without the support of the School. Well done to everyone who participated.





### Deputy Premier Visit

In late August, the Deputy Mayor and I were pleased to host South Australia's Deputy Premier Vickie Chapman who has recently taken up the portfolios of planning and local government to her roles. This meeting, also attended by our local member Nick McBride, provided the opportunity to discuss the new State planning arrangements and to showcase the opportunities that Council sees for Robe.

### Tourism and Events Workshop

Early in August we held a workshop to develop a Tourism & Event Strategy for Robe. This strategy has been developed in conjunction with the Robe Tourism Association (RTA) in order to have one joint strategy for Robe. In this strategy, we noted the importance of having Robe's strategy somewhat aligned to the State and Regional tourism strategies as this can be beneficial when working together with these higher bodies and when applying for grant funding. We also found that there was a strong alignment between items raised in this workshop, the Annual Business Plan and the Robe prospectus. Once the draft of Robe's Tourism & Event Strategy is completed this will be distributed to RTA members for consultation before taking this document to Council for endorsement. There was great a contribution by all involved in this workshop and we thank them for their participation.



## Community WasteWater Pump Upgrades

Council has just commissioned the replacement of the wet well and pumps for two key locations within our Community Wastewater Management System (CWMS). The pumps were located at the corner of Laurel Terrace and Powell Avenue and on Main Road near Cawthorne Drive.

Although the infrastructure is mainly underground for these two replacements, it is a substantial budget line to ensure the continued operation of our CWMS on behalf of all Robe residents.



## Moonshots Visit

Special thanks to Geoff Dening for organising a number of Moonshots members to undertake a tour of Robe. Moonshots operate a co-working space in Adelaide that incorporates a range of facilities including:

- Hot desks
- Secure and independent office spaces
- Licensable bar and entertaining area for up to 100 people
- Coffee shop facilities
- High speed internet
- Shared board room and kitchen facilities
- Professional video, sound and photographic studio

Moonshots is home to entrepreneurs, designers, inventors, pitchers, thinkers, rebels, writers, creatives, philosophers, futurists etc.

Council is exploring the opportunity for a similar facility to be established in Robe. It is felt that Robe's culture and beautiful setting would provide the right environment for an innovations and business hub. This new initiative would provide an alternative workspace for part time and full time work from Robe. Jamie Aitken, the Mayor and I presented to the Moonshot members on the benefits of Robe. This was followed by a dinner at The Project that showcased the fine food and wine of the Region. Moonshots also launched a Block Chain initiative that is planned to be based in Robe and focused on our high quality food production on the Limestone Coast.

## Change to Pension Discounts at Waste Transfer Station

Council has a pension discount for a boot load of rubbish at the Waste Transfer Station. The discount was only available for a boot load and Council employees received many request from pensioners when they bring waste in a trailer to the Waste Transfer Station to receive the same discount as they get for a boot load. Often, the employees get the pensioners to go home and take the waste from the trailer and put it into the boot to receive a discount. In support of the pensioners in our community, Council resolved to introduce a 25 percent discount per trailer load on the production of a pension card. This decision took into consideration that the management of all waste at the Waste Transfer Station is a cost to community that needs to be funded through Council's normal revenue streams.

## Representation Review

A reminder that the District Council of Robe is undertaking a review to determine whether a change of arrangements is required in respect to the Council's elector representation. The purpose of the review is to ensure that electors of the Council area are being adequately and fairly represented.

This decision means that the consumption of alcohol will be prohibited for the period 12 noon, Saturday 26 December 2020 until 12 midnight, Monday 3 January 2021.



## Best Ociana Building Demolition

As advised last month, Best Ociana is still waiting for SA Power Networks to disconnect the power so that the demolition of the building at the marina can commence. We will notify through Facebook and Council's website once dates have been confirmed.

## MyLocal Services App

MyLocal Services is a mobile phone app that allows you to report a problem within the Council area, receive notifications about waste collection days and check Waste Transfer Station opening times. The app is designed to make it more convenient to find Council information 24/7. You'll never forget bin day again!!

You can also find places 'Near Me' such as parks and playgrounds.

We encourage all residents and ratepayers to download the App. It is very easy to use, and the details are specific to your house location. MyLocal Services App can be downloaded from the Apple App Store and Google Play.



## Monitoring Robe's Coastline

One of the substantial issues managed by Council on behalf of our community is the coastline. Our connection with the coastline is a key reason why residents choose to live here and our visitors choose to come here. Management of our coastline requires specialist knowledge, skills and equipment as coastal dynamics impacts on the shoreline and private and community assets. To improve our knowledge, there were two key reports presented at the August Ordinary Council Meeting:

1. Analyses of Beach and Nearshore Profiles and Shoreline Mapping from Historical Imagery, Robe South Australia Report was prepared by the Beach and Dune Systems Laboratory at Flinders University; and
2. Robe Coastline Monitoring Roadmap – Wavelength Consulting July 2020

Wavelength have broken the coastline into 17 coastal units and provided a monitoring plan for each unit. The coastline reports were used to prepare a robust monitoring plan or Roadmap based on specific cost-effective priority monitoring pathway for each coastal unit.

The Roadmaps clarify what different coastal monitoring tools can and cannot do, where and why they should be used and the expected frequency they should be applied in order to reduce risks to Council assets and public safety. The Wavelength report also identifies specific short-term actions to address urgent risks.

Wavelength found that the previous reports provided a good basis for the management of our coastline but also there were some gaps and limitations, including:

-Future monitoring recommendations are sound, for example the review of erosion rates based on additional erosion monitoring. However, they are limited by the lack of clear purpose. Each monitoring recommendation would benefit from the provision of a clear purpose e.g. to allow refinement of the proposed buffer zone or comparison of erosion extent to long-term action trigger(s).

-A range of monitoring techniques are discussed without detail on why, how, or where each technique should be applied. For example, the repeat drone footage at Cape Dombey provides a visual assessment of change, but unless the video/imagery is collected at the same angles, same locations and under the same tide conditions it is difficult to accurately assess changes. The information also needs to link back to physical measurements where possible to enable risks to be quantified. This gap was also raised by Flinders University.

-None of the recommended monitoring addresses how the data is to be evaluated and the results used to provide evidence-based decision making.

-For the coastal cliffs, quantitative assessment of recession rates measured to date (e.g. Fotheringham, 2009; Hesp and DaSilva, 2020) could be applied to other areas of similar coastal morphology. However, measuring change in the position of the cliff edge does not provide a complete assessment of the potential hazard or the associated risk. These soft rock cliffs typically comprise erodible lower layers capped by a more resistant layer leading to undercuts and overhangs. The existing cliff recession rates do not account for this and potentially underestimate changes below the cliff line that could induce failure.

These gaps and limitations have been considered in the development of the monitoring process and plan.

The recommended priorities for Council are:

Based on the discussion at Council, a grant application has been submitted to the Coast Protection Board for the key risks identified above.

### COVID-19 Council Lessee Relief Policy

The COVID-19 pandemic has created a number of challenges both for landlords and tenants. Accordingly, the Federal and State Governments' initiatives aimed at assisting parties to commercial leases during the COVID-19 pandemic have continued to evolve. As a landlord on behalf of community, the District Council of Robe is impacted by changes in legislation.

In particular, the COVID-19 Emergency Response (Commercial Leases No 2) Regulations 2020 (SA) (Second COVID Response Regulations), which revoke and replace the First COVID Response Regulations, also came into operation on 15 May 2020. This new legislation impacts on our commercial leases with a caravan park, medical centre, dentist (within medical centre), seven Residential Tenancy Agreements and a small number of Annual Marina Leases.

If a lessee meets the criteria in the legislation then Council:

1. Cannot charge interest on unpaid rent for the period from 30 March 2020 to 30 September 2020. When assessing the lessee's position, Council must have regard to the economic impacts of the COVID-19 pandemic on the parties to the lease, the provisions of the COVID Response Act and the Second COVID Response Regulations and the Commonwealth Code.

2. In accordance with the Commonwealth Code must:  
-Consider offering tenants proportionate reductions in rent in the form of waivers and deferrals based on a tenant's reduction in trade, with waivers to make up at least 50% of the reduction; and  
-Not apply interest; and  
-Repayment should be amortised over the greater of the balance of the lease term and 24 months.

To support the implementation of this new legislation, a new policy has been introduced.

### Smart Farms Small Grants

Farmers, fishers and foresters can now apply for Australian Government funding of up to \$100,000 to support their natural resource management efforts.

The Federal Government's Smart Farms Small Grants program supports projects that address a range of natural resource management issues including soil health, pest and weed management, farm production efficiency, Indigenous involvement, climate and market risk and use of new technologies to improve sustainable practices.

Smart Farms Small Grants is an open, competitive grant opportunity supporting one to two year projects to increase farming, forestry and fishing communities' awareness, knowledge, skills and capacity to adopt best practice sustainable agriculture.

There is \$6.5 million available for this round of Smart Farms Small Grants. Projects may be delivered locally, regionally or multi-regionally.

This is a very popular program that will be highly competitive and will deliver real benefits for farms, the environment and local communities.

Smart Farms Small Grants is a sustainable agriculture element of the National Landcare Program (NLP).

The Australian Government is investing more than \$1 billion towards the second phase of the NLP from 2018-2023.

## Changes to our Streetscapes

VMS Dredging Contractors have arrived in town this week and will be dredging the Marina and channel in the lead up to the fishing season. A large temporary pipeline is being installed and will cross the Marina Boat Yard and run over the hill, through the little gate near the Chinese monument and along the foreshore path all the way to Main Town beach, where the dredged sand will be deposited. 

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
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
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
