MAYORS REPORT & COUNCIL NEWS

New Year's

The dry zones have again greatly assisted with the management of behaviour on New Year's Eve. Overall the amount of rubbish and glass was less than other years particularly in the town and foreshore areas. Long beach was the exception with rubbish left in piles at party sites. This required considerable clean up from Council staff. Police were very happy with the behaviour this year. Council and Police will soon undertake a debrief in preparation for next New Year.

EFTPOS Service Difficulties

Businesses have been having problems with connection to EFTPOS. CE Roger Sweetman is seeking advice from service providers. This problem occurred at the peak visitor times last year.

2012 In Review

Last year CEO Bill Hender moved back to his hometown of Keith. During the interim phase while the recruitment process was conducted, Mr Dean Gollan assisted as Acting CEO. By now many of you have met the new CE Mr Roger Sweetman. Roger is settling in well and looking forward to his role and responsibilities at Robe. I would like to acknowledge the great job the Administration team has made during the whole recruitment process, there has been additional workload and sharing of skill sets during the process thank you all for your dedication. The Works crew have had a busy year, the following being a snap shot of some of the works

- Construction of car park at Netball club
- Widen cutting and lower hilltop at Faryefield Lane cutting to improve sight lines
- Install Rural Addressing signage district wide
- Construction of 4.8 kms Nora Creina Road
- STEDS pump upgrade at station 19
- Revegetation works around new STEDS pond
- Beacon Hill emergency vehicle track
- Paving and fencing Bowling club
- New foot bridge at the Outlet
- Single coat reseals
- Fencing at the air field
- Fencing at Obelisk

Contractors have also assisted with

- Repair work to complete the Breakwater
- Pathways sealed from Lake Butler to Obelisk
- STEDS lagoon and associated filtration plant
- Irrigation to Golf Club and Football ground utilising water from the reuse scheme [treated effluent water]
- Channel dredging

Council is committed to sound financial management while maintaining the district assets in a sustainable way.

Several of the bigger projects for 2013 include stage one of the Wright's Bay Road and construction of the new Transfer Station.

Finally, thank you to all staff and my fellow Councillors for their efforts in 2012.



Child Care on Wheels Service

This year there will be many changes which may impact on the CCOWS delivery of service. State Legislation and National Regulations covering the "Single Entry into Kindergarten" and the "Provision of 15 hours Kindergarten for each child in the year prior to School", will mean that CCOWS needs to shift to another venue on alternate Fridays so that the Kindergarten can use their site. We are fortunate to be able to use the RSL Hall which is adjacent to the Kindergarten. This will be the first time some of our children have been into the Hall. With every change children (and staff) need time to adjust and settle. We are calling this year our "Year of Transition" as we move through the changes in compliance and expectations. We are fortunate to have the cooperation of parents, organisations and the community; and of course the flexibility and commitment of the CCOWS staff members. Happy New Year, we are looking forward to positive outcomes for CCOWS in 2013.

Works Report

In the lead up to the busy holiday period in Robe there have been a number of Works projects on the go. Reseals of a number of town Streets have been completed. Line Marking has been done throughout the Town. This work could not happen until the Reseals were finished. The Ramps onto the beach have had maintenance work carried out on them along with the car parks on the Western side of Town. The walkways throughout the town have been trimmed and maintained. Maintenance mowing of the entrance of Town and the parks has been completed to help showcase the town during the holidays. Street sweeping has been done in the old Town area. A new recycling bin has been put in at the rotunda at Long Beach. This was possible because of a grant that we received through KESAB and the Coke- Cola Foundation. The wooden bin surrounds have been sanded and oiled. The walking bridge over the outlet has been replaced, which I have received many favorable comments about.

Roads graded in the last month were:

Dairy Range Road, Bagdad Road, Parkers Road, Baxter's Hill Road, Long Island Road, Murra Up Road, Cossacks Water Hole, Drabschs Hundred line, Powell's Road, Nora Creina and Bog Lane.

Road Conditions

A combination of the hot weather and traffic flows has resulted in the road reseal on Bagot Street and other roads "bleeding" bitumen. The timing of Councils road reseals program is governed by a need to have a relatively high road surface temperature and the availability of contractors and this year both of these factors coincided with the start of the towns tourist season. Council is aware that the bitumen has become tacky and has attached itself to car tyres and shoes. To reduce the impact of this Council has placed crusher dust on the road which will help to solidify the material until it has time to cure.

New Years Eve

It was pleasing to see a busy and vibrant Robe during the holiday season with the many visitors to our town enjoying the great weather, fantastic beaches and welcoming hospitality. It is good to be able to report that the town saw the New Year in a manner that resulted in the police and Council staff having very few problems. There was little vandalism or incidence of anti social behavior and the community and visitors are to be congratulated. The Police and Council will be holding a debriefing to identify ways in which the night can be improved and everyone's enjoyment ensured.

Development Assessment Panel Procedures

Recently there has been some confusion as to how Councils Development Assessment Panel conducts its business, specifically the process whereby members of the public and others are able to make representations to the Panel. To assist both the panel members and members of the community Council has adopted Operating Procedures for the Panel which provides guidance in relation to;

- The frequency of meetings
- Meeting quorum and keeping of minutes, and
- How decisions are made.

Proposed redevelopment of the Robe Golf Club

Council is in continuing discussions with the Robe Golf Club regarding options for the possible development of the golf course. While the options and discussions surrounding these options are confidential at this point of time Council is able to report that it is obtaining information as to ;

- (a) The value of certain parcels of the golf club land and
- (b) The value of the native vegetation upon

These two pieces of information do not commit the Council to any course of action or in fact any action at all but will assist Council in properly assessing any proposal put forward by the Golf Club.

Future of Local Government

Together with our Local Government partners within the South East, the Robe Council has made representations to the Local Government Expert Panel on the possible future development within Local Government over the next 30 to 40 years. The Expert Panel comprising of Members with Local Government/State Government /Financial and legal experience have been asked by the Local Government Association to review amongst other matters;

- The role and function of Councils in key areas of activity,
- Identify barriers to the delivery of services, governance and strategies to raise performance ,
- Opportunities for service innovation.

At a recent workshop with the panel many and varied subjects were discussed and some of the main points presented by the South East Councils were;

- Regional collaboration opportunities have to be investigated to ensure Councils become more effective and efficient
- The other levels of government may not be able to assist and local councils will have to help themselves,
- Financial pressure is increasing while community expectations are also increasing.

It will be interesting to see the outcomes of these investigations and the impact they may have upon the District Council of Robe.

Children's Fun Fair Lipson Park

The operation of the Fun Fair at Lipson Park is a trial to see if;

- It is financially viable for the operators ,
- Whether the Robe Community support a Fun Fair,
- And if the fun fair returns next holiday's season where should it be located.

Council has received a mixture of negative and positive comments regarding the operation of the fun fair however it is fair to say that all comments are supportive of the idea of such a facility being in Robe during the summer holiday season. The big question relates to suitable locations. Please forward any comments you have on the concept to council to assist Council is arriving at a decision for next year.

BOOK REVIEW**The Girl who Circumnavigated Fairyland in a Ship of Her Own Making - Catherynne M. Valente**

A few weeks ago Wendy handed the above book to me for an opinion. She knows my predilection for books with weird titles. I used to like fantasy but I thought I'd had an overdose of Nania, Hogwarts and Hobbits but now T.G.W.C.F.I.A.S.O.H.O.M has reawakened my interest. I loved its style, the names of its characters, the wit and humour. Especially I loved the illustrations by Spanish-born Ana Juan. As I was getting into the book, I kept wondering at what audience it was aimed and came to the conclusion that anyone from 9 to 90 should derive pleasure from it. Small people might miss out on some of the mythological or political references but not in a bothersome manner, and no longer eligible to know these things, maybe some adults may miss out on the kids' stuff. Rather than my conjectures, I have included the author's own words about the book [taken from the internet] She does it better than I! Every hero, sooner or later, goes to the Underworld. Odysseus, Dante, Orpheus, Rama, Coyote—the whole Campbellian deck of cards. Sometimes it's the land of the dead and sometimes you have to go see the demon-king to get your girl back, but to get through your story, you gotta go underground. And so does September. The very axiomaticness of the Underworld interests me and excites me as a writer. I like to wander around with a big stick, poking at the basic building blocks of myth, tipping them over to see what's underneath, how strong they are, how they got there to begin with. If there's a Big Idea that unifies all the Fairyland novels to come, it would be Taking It Seriously Like Whoa. All the tropes of fairy tales and quests and folklore and portal fantasies and old school children's books. Add complexity. Add emotional crunchiness. Add poking with a big stick. Simmer for five books. From the moment I ended the first Fairyland book I knew that in the second, September would be going to the Underworld, to Fairyland-Below. She originally came to Fairyland on a Persephone visa, after all. It was always waiting for her. She returns to Fairyland a year older, a teenager—and with growing older comes understanding that for every act there are consequences, that no story ends neatly with all's well that ends well, that the trouble with growing a heart is that it can be used against you. September's sacrifice of her shadow in the first book is the root of the second—her shadow has grown up, too, given herself a name, and become Halloween, the Hollow Queen, ruler of Fairyland-Below. And she is stealing shadows from the world above. Shadows belonging to, among others, a Wyverary, a Marid, and an old enemy. Katabasis is a fancy Greek word for what happens to Persephone: she goes to the Underworld and returns. Inanna does it too—she gives up all the things that define her and goes to meet her sister, her other self, in the land of the dead. To some extent all otherworlds are also underworlds: Narnia and Wonderland and Oz and Dictionopolis and Hogwarts. Underworlds are not just dark and mysterious places, reversals of our own world, they are testing grounds. A brave child leaves the world they know and understand and travels to a place where the rules do not apply, where there are monsters, where the things a child fears are made literal. This is why the capital of Fairyland is Pandemonium—Fairylands are by definition underworlds. Fairies were always devils when they weren't ghosts—of past cultures, of human wishes, of a lost and mostly fictional state of wild and uninhibited natural soul. Fairyland-Below is the underworld of an underworld. As a certain Wyverary says, "It's underworlds all the way down." But it's not enough to just ship September underground to dance Inanna's jig with her shadow-self—not with this big stick just lying here. What I wanted was an underworld that didn't really know or care that it was an underworld. The Other doesn't see itself as Other. It is its own Self, with the same fears and taboos and journeys. The scary place that everyone avoids is just a place, different, strange, but its own country with its own troubles. Fairyland-Below is a huge nation, as big as Fairyland-Above, and the shadows Halloween steals are just as alive as the people they were attached to. The trouble with growing a heart is complexity—nothing is easy anymore.

The Other was minding its own business before some terrified thing blundered in and starting call it all sorts of names, using up everything in sight, and hollering that fighting back just goes to show how wicked and uncivilized it is. Wendy sewed Peter Pan's shadow back on and never asked its leave. September's shadow has an army, and a needle just won't go through. In fact, the male and female experiences of the Underworld are typically different: Odysseus goes to the Underworld bravely, voluntarily, to get information and immediately leave, Theseus, post-labyrinth, goes on a frat-boy prank with his friends. Persephone is taken and must always return. Inanna dies there. Not too many girls lose their shadows either—because girls so often are the shadows, the reflection of the male hero, standing in for all his darker impulses: jealousy, pettiness, weakness, deceit, sexuality. Girls are the Other. Their own countries, no less or uglier than boys, but called the devil and worse by those with power. The shadow version of oneself is like the Underworld itself—a wilder, darker, more primal version, a place where the things we try to bury with civilization come roaring to life. September's shadow has no rules or boundaries and it is always tempting to live that way. One of the great sources of interest and humor in portal fantasies is the contrast between the protagonist's expectations and reality. September expects the devil, and finds herself. The fact is, I love underworld stories. I love them because I grew up spending the summers in California with my mothers and the winters in Seattle with my father and damn if that girl and her pomegranates didn't speak to me. I love them because they are about lifting up the world and seeing how it works, under the hood, under the light. And I love them because they are about our experience in the real world, not only death, but living. We all have times, some of us many of them, when we have messed up, intending to do right, intending the very best of outcomes, and still profoundly blown it. We all go underground, sooner or later, into dark places, depression and grief and shame, isolation and anxiety and abandonment. We go there to meet ourselves, to judge ourselves and often too harshly, to take some lesson or hope back with us. Sometimes it even works. And adolescence is one long journey toward oneself, one's future, possible self, the path into the frightful dark of change and the long struggle up again—into adulthood, which is another way of saying more and constant change. What you learn down there is how to survive and not to fear. And that's why we keep writing about it. Because we keep living it. To get through your story, you gotta go underground. Even if fairy stories are not high on your list of reading preferences, I urge you [as I usually do] to give it a try. I would love to know how you got on with September and her adventures.....and thank you to Wendy for asking me to read it. There is now a sequel called "The Girl Who Fell Beneath Fairyland and Led the Revels There" but I've not read it yet.

Final call for old photos and memorabilia

Just about every family has one – a box of old photos or slides tucked under a bed or on top of a cupboard that they mean to sort out one day. But not everyone realises how valuable they might be in helping to capture and preserve the everyday lives and pastimes that make up a community's history.

Author Liz Harfull and Wakefield Press are making one last call for images and memorabilia (such as post cards, souvenirs, posters and event programs), to help illustrate their book about Robe, which is about to go into the final stages of production.

Liz is keen to hear from people as soon as possible if they have material from any time up to the early 1970s to help illustrate the book. While she is interested in anything from the Robe area, including Nora Creina and Boatswain Point, she is particularly keen to find material relating to:

- Horse breeding and horse racing at Robe (surprisingly, there are currently no photos in public collections on this subject even though race meetings were held at Robe on and off right up to the mid 1900s).
- Shark and lobster fishing, including early boats and boat crews, processing factories, backyard operations in the 1940s rendering shark livers, and dumping at Factory Bay.
- Early surfing and surfing competitions at Long Beach.
- Summer activities such as camping and caravanning, beach picnics, sailing, social events at the institute, June Bronhill's return visit to Robe in the 1980s, and going to the movies.
- The football and bowling clubs, including Bub Thomson's famous chook raffles, and early games and gatherings at the oval and the bowling club.

Even if you are not sure what you have and whether it's of interest, give Liz a call. Importantly, she is not asking people to part with the originals. She can help organise high resolution scanned copies and provide you with digital versions for your family archives. With the owner's permission, copies will also be made available to the Robe Library's history collection for the benefit of future generations.

DOORWAY ROCK, ROBE



Ingredients

1 medium crayfish cooked and halved

Mornay Sauce Ingredients

310 ml milk
65ml cream
1 bay leaf
65g cheese, grated
1 small onion, chopped
salt and black pepper
5 black peppercorns
15 ml butter, extra, melted
30g butter
65g fresh breadcrumbs
2 tablespoons plain flour

Method

1. Remove the crayfish meat from the shells and cut into bite size pieces. Reserve the shells
2. In a saucepan, place the milk, bay leaf, onion and peppercorns and heat slowly to boiling point. Remove from the heat, cover and stand for 10 minutes, strain
3. In a pan, heat the butter, remove from the heat. Stir in the flour and blend, gradually adding the strained milk
4. Return the pan to the heat, and stir constantly until the sauce boils and thickens. Simmer the sauce for 1 minute
5. Remove from the heat, add the cream, cheese, salt and pepper. Stir the sauce until the cheese melts, then add the crayfish meat
6. Melt extra butter in a small pan, add the breadcrumbs, and stir to combine
7. Divide the crayfish mixture between the shells, scatter the crumbs over the crayfish and brown under a hot grill
