CEO's Report

Changes to the Community Newsletter

Council in an effort to improve its ability to consult with and communicate with all of its ratepayers and community members will be making some minor changes to the manner in which the Community Newsletter will be made available and its distribution.

Council acknowledges that the current community newsletter does not engage with the 67% of Council ratepayers that do not permanently reside in the Council area nor its rural community who don't automatically receive a copy of the Community Newsletter.

It is also acknowledged that the current delivery of the newsletter, thrown on the front lawn as the waste bin is collected is not an ideal way of distributing the Community Newsletter.

Commencing in December 2018, the following changes will take place:

- A Council Newsletter will be produced 4 times a year and posted to all ratepayers in July, September, December and March. This document will only contain Council information, it will not contain community notices and local business advertising.
- The Community Newsletter in its current format will be produced the other eight months of the year and will no longer be thrown out as the waste is collected but will be placed in every Post Office box in Robe, and will be available at the Council office, Library and other business locations throughout the town.
- Both documents will be available on Council's website and if you have provided Council with your email address, will be emailed to you.

Council have written to all the local businesses and community groups who advertise in the Community Newsletter advising them of the changes.

Council believe that these changes will assist Council in improving its engagement with all members of its community.

Major Capital Projects

Public Toilet Upgrade

Council have resolved not to proceed with this project and it will be up to the newly elected Council to consider the construction of the toilets in the 2019-2020 Budget deliberations.

Sea Wall and Beach Access Ramp – Main Beach

The majority of this project has been completed with only the lower section of concrete and the handrails to be installed in November when the tides will allow this work to be completed.

Once the concrete has cured, machinery will be able to access the ramp and provide a safe access at the end of the concrete to allow safe access to the beach.

Council will be undertaking the replacement of the footpath along the top of the ramp and with the assistance of Coast Care, the Robe Primary School and local residents, will be vegetating the area adjacent the bowling club.

Fox Beach – Protection of the Dunes

Fox Beach has suffered considerable erosion of the dunes which has left the public infrastructure at the rear of the dunes (roadway and footpath vulnerable to damage from storm surge).

Council has engaged engineers to prepare a plan for works to be undertaken at Fox Beach to protect the dunes and the public infrastructure behind the dunes. Once the design has been approved by Council, Council will be approaching the Coast Protection Board regarding any opportunity for funding to assist with these works.

Medical Centre Upgrade

Work has commenced with the removal of all fittings and asbestos from the Medical Centre.

Dairy Range Road Reconstruction

Council works staff have realigned the road to ensure it is compliant with current Australian Standards and has relocated services which will allow for the new road service to be constructed over the next few months.

Robe Street Carpark

The centre section of the Robe Street carpark has been paved and shade trees planted. The connection of the carpark to the adjacent footpaths is expected to commence in the coming months.

Upgrade Community Wastewater Treatment Lagoon

Tenders have been called for the upgrade of the CWMS treatment lagoon at Evans Cave Road.

This work is being undertaken to:

- Replace the fabric liner of the lagoon to ensure the integrity of the lagoon, and
- Increase the capacity of the lagoon

The first stage of this work will involve the drainage of the lagoon with the treated water being pumped onto the new golf course development to assist the Golf Club with the construction of the new six goal holes.

Public Access to Fox Beach

The access ramp to Fox Beach was damaged by recent storms and has been removed.

Council have resolved to install a second access to the beach and a design for this work is currently being undertaken.

Robe Cemetery – Niche Wall

Council have resolved to defer the construction of a new niche wall at the Robe cemetery and any decision with regard to this will be made by the newly elected council after the November Council elections.

Council apologises for any inconvenience this decision may cause members of our community as a result of not having facilities available at the cemetery for the interment of ashes.

Foreshore Fence

Council recently received a presentation from the Executive Officer of the Local Government Association Mutual Liability Scheme and the Scheme's lawyers in relation to Council's responsibilities in with respect to risk management and the management of Council assets.

Council has resolved that prior to making any decision in relation to the current fence or any extension to the existing fence, Council members will undertake a risk assessment procedure in order to fully understand and appreciate Council's responsibilities.

Planting on Roadsides

Property owners who plant trees and shrubs on the road verge adjacent their properties are reminded that they need to seek approval from Council in accordance with the provisions of the Local Government Act 1999.

The reasons for needing approval prior to planting is to ensure that:

- Site distances from road intersections and property driveways are not impaired,
- The public use of footpaths is not impeded, and
- The underground services within the road reserve (water effluent, telecommunications etc.) are not compromised.

Your cooperation is appreciated and you can collect an application form from the Council office or from Council's website.

Vehicle Access Hooper's Beach

Council in response to the community views has decided to close Hooper's Beach to access by vehicles.

There is a risk associated with the interaction of vehicles and people especially young children on beaches.

Accidents happen in situations where something unexpected occurs and that was not anticipated.

The vehicle use of Hooper's Beach is infrequent and users of Hooper's Beach do not expect to be sharing the beach with vehicles therefore they are not as vigilant as families who frequent Long Beach.

The risk at Hooper's Beach can be easily mitigated by removing the ability for vehicles to access the beach.

Such action manages Council's risk while not inconveniencing the majority of the community.

District Council of Robe 2018-2019 Annual Business Plan and Budget

The District Council of Robe's 2018-2019 budget balances the need to manage the impact of the budget upon ratepayers with the need to upgrade and maintain the community assets that Council manages on behalf of the community.

Council has \$97,408,000 worth of community assets and infrastructure which need to be in a condition that they are able to be used by the community and Councils capital projects for 2018-2019 ensures that Council will continue to invest in the renewal and maintenance of these assets.

In 2018 -2019 Council will be undertaking \$4,211,000 million dollars of capital works with the major items being:

- Upgrade and extension of the Robe Medical Centre, this will ensure that the district has medical facilities that are in a condition that they can service the communities medical and allied health needs well into the future.
- Upgrade of the effluent treatment ponds at Evans Cave Road – these works will ensure that the effluent treatment system complies with the SA Health Commission and Environment Protection Authority requirements as well as providing increased capacity to treat the town's effluent. Failure to undertake these works would seriously limit the growth and development of the town as the treatment of effluent is a service that cannot be provided at less than 100% capacity.
- Improvements to the Davenport Street storm water retention basin and stormwater management system.
- Continuing with the rural road re-sheeting program which is a long term project to improve the condition of the districts rural unsealed roads.

Council will be funding its operational services and capital projects:

- Within a modest rate rise of 3.3% in total rate revenue received, this acknowledged that 1% increase is attributable to development growth within the district,
- Wastewater management service charge increase of 2.3%,
- Waste management service charge increase of 7.8%. The waste management service charge is a fee for service and therefore the users of the service pay for the costs of providing the service and the increase in fees this year is to cover the substantial costs that Council will incur due to China's ban on receiving recycled materials, and
- Loan borrowings estimated to be \$1,150,000.

Council for the first time in the past years will be borrowing to assist with its capital projects plan. Council currently has no debt as a result of sound financial management in the past four years and having no debt now provides Council with the financial flexibility to manage its asset upgrades.

Property valuations is the basis upon which council rates are calculated and property values are determined by the Office of the Valuer General.

In the past twelve months the value increases across the district have not been constant with rural property values increasing at a higher % than township properties.

In order that Council mitigates the financial impact of the property value increases, Council has capped the maximum that Council rates can increase from the previous year to 10%.

This cap doesn't apply to those properties whose physical attributes have altered by either building work or property boundary alignment.

I would like to assure all members of the community that the Elected Members are aware of the importance of prudent financial management and take the task very seriously on behalf of the rate payers.

Consider for a moment how everyday life is improved by the many services that councils provide. Imagine your community without street lighting, rubbish collection, footpaths, libraries, playgrounds and sports club facilities, community halls, senior's services – and the list goes on. Decisions about council services, policies and projects are made by people just like you, who care about what's happening in their local community.

It's a great way to develop your knowledge

Councils deal with an enormous range of subjects, from economic development and environmental protection to dog and cat management ... the list and variety is almost endless. As a councillor you'll learn about a wide range of topics and the legislative and budgetary frameworks that sit around them.

You want to contribute to your community

As you learn about council business and develop your knowledge of council meeting procedures, you'll have the opportunity to contribute to the (often robust) discussions in chamber and build further in terms of your confidence in your public speaking and debating skills by representing your community.

You want to provide a voice for your age group/cultural group/gender

Like other levels of government and most of our social institutions, councils are typically made up of older 'anglo' males. They are knowledgeable and experienced and more often than not, nominate for council, however to achieve a greater diversity similar to our communities we encourage people of different ages, genders, cultures and backgrounds to step up and make themselves heard on council. We believe this is the best way to ensure a broad range of views are represented on council.

You're sick of watching from the sidelines

Are you one of the silent majority growing increasingly frustrated with the state of politics as you watch from the sidelines? Councils are the closest level of government to the community, so stop shouting at the TV and nominate for council instead!

You've got great ideas to contribute

Think you know how things could be better? Being closer to the community, councils are more agile and responsive to community needs than other levels of government and have a record of implementing innovate new ideas.

It's a nice addition to your CV

Community service (tick). Broad range of knowledge (tick). Ability to put forward a cogent argument (tick). Understanding of political systems and processes (tick). Ability to work constructively in a team environment (tick). What aspiring executive wouldn't want to add a stint on council to their CV?

You'll meet interesting people

As a councillor you'll represent the residents in your council ward – and that means you'll get to meet a few of them! You'll also work closely with your fellow councillors and council staff.

It's a way of making a meaningful and lasting contribution

You'll play an important part in the ongoing life and development of your community. In years to come you'll be able to say things like "I had a role in getting that new sports centre built" or "I helped get that program started to support our migrant community".

Your chance to make a different

The workings of council are often criticised due to lack of knowledge of what legislation governs how councils run and what can and can't be resolved during a council meeting. Councils can be quite complex and a challenge to some. However, there is training available to those newly elected and support systems in place to help ease the way. Ask most councillors they'll say it can be a challenge however helping make a difference in their communities makes it all worthwhile. Use this opportunity to get out and make a difference! Nominate for council.

Enrol to Vote



Voting in Council elections is open to a broader range of people than State and Federal elections. Even if you are not an Australian citizen, and/or not on the State Electoral Roll you can vote in a Council election, as long as you are above 18 years of age and have lived in the council area for more than one month. You can also vote in a council election if you own a rateable property in the area, regardless of whether you live in it. Another important difference is that businesses and body-corporates can vote in council elections.

New laws for cat and dog owners and breeders have been introduced in South Australia. These changes are designed to improve dog and cat management and welfare and are the result of years of planning and public consultation.

DACO – a new way to register your dog or cat

Dog registration renewal notices will be sent directly from Dogs and Cats Online from 17th July. Use the guide below to complete your dog registration renewal online. Online payment options are credit card or bPay. Please visit the Council office if you require any assistance when renewing your dog registration.

Microchipping and desexing – it's compulsory

From 1 July 2018, it will be compulsory for:

- All dogs and cats over a certain age to be microchipped
- All new generations of dogs and cats (born after 1 July 2018) to be desexed *exemptions apply for working dogs, registered breeders etc*

These changes are designed to increase the likelihood of lost or impounded dogs and cats being reunited with their owners, and reduce the number of unwanted and abandoned litters euthanised in pounds and shelters.

Discount Microchipping

While the new desexing requirement only affects dogs and cats born after 1 July 2018, all dogs and cats must be microchipped by this date. Microchipping is a safe and permanent way to identify your dog and cat. The procedure is quick, with no ongoing discomfort and can only be carried out by a trained, authorised implanter. Discount microchipping days are offered throughout the state at various times of the year. Visit dogandcatboard.com.au or chipblitz.com.au for more details.

New rules for Breeders and Sellers

There are also new rules for breeders and sellers, including:

- From July 1, 2018, breeders and sellers who breed dogs and cats for sale must be registered with the Dog and Cat Management Board as a breeder.
- Breeders and sellers must now adhere to new industry standards and guidelines, which stipulate the minimum welfare conditions that must be met to comply with the state's animal welfare laws. For more information, visit the animal welfare section of environment.sa.gov.au
- A new requirement for dog and cat sellers to provide certain information in advertisements and to the buyer.

Changes to dog registration categories

As of 2017, dog registration in South Australia has been simplified. Your dog now falls under one of these two simple categories. These changes have been made to streamline registration categories throughout the state.

Standard dog: a dog that is both desexed and microchipped

Non-standard dog: all other dogs, even if they are exempt from the rules around desexing or microchipping, such as dogs belonging to registered breeders, working livestock dogs etc.

5. Check the dog details including your dog's
microchip number

6. Enter your payment details to pay
and complete the renewal process
